

EARLY YEARS

Nursery

Having celebrated Pancake Day and World Book Day, this has been a wonderfully busy week! We have continued with our Rosie's Walk story throughout the nursery this week. We had great fun using

orange playdough to create our own Rosie Hens, using loose parts and coloured feathers—we brought our creations to life!



This week we have been learning about the life cycle of frogs through the story of The Teeny Tiny Tadpole. We also learnt about why we celebrate Pancake Day and the children had the option of pancakes at lunch. In maths, we have been looking at making patterns, using various materials and shapes. The children were excited to see the ducklings - Mrs Baldwin got a surprise when they began to hatch ahead of time!





KEY STAGE 1

Year 1

Year 1 began looking at plants during our science. They planted their cress seeds on their own. They continued to draw pictures of what the seed looked like and they were able to describe what the seed looked like. They also predicted what the plant seed would grow into and drew their predictions.



Year 2

This week we have been looking at weight in maths. We enjoyed exploring and read-

ing different scales. We also enjoyed linking this learning to addition and subtraction by using Numicon to ensure that the weight was balanced. In geography we have enjoyed learning about the different coastlines that surround the United Kingdom.



LOWER KEY STAGE 2

Year 3

The children threw themselves into World Book Day with great gusto. They enjoyed various activities including, author webinars, reading from other teachers and a book swap.

Blue class also performed their class assembly, which was well received by the whole school and parents.



Year 4

This term, the children will be learning about Scientists and Inventors. They have been researching deforestation in Madagascar. They created a PowerPoint presentation on the work of Gerard Durell, a conservationist who worked hard to save many plants and animals in Madagascar.



UPPER KEY STAGE 2

Year 5

This week, we wrote our setting description based on our

class book, Boy in the Tower. We tried to include all the key features of a setting description that we learned last week. For World Book Day, we took part in the 'Footy and Booky World Book Day event,' the 'Learn How to Be a Billionaire (Sort Of) with Pamela Butchart event,' and the



'Mighty Myths Live Drawing with Thiago de Moraes event.' As part of World Book Day, stories were read across the school by different adults, which we thoroughly enjoyed.

Year 6

This week, we have been exploring narratives in English, fo-

cusing on using direct and indirect speech effectively.

In maths, we have been recapping place value and decimal points. In science, we have introduced our new topic of 'Light'. This included some fun experiments of trying to make shadow shapes with our hands!

Penalty Notice Fines for absence from school are changing

From 19th August 2024 Penalty Notice fines increase to £160 for each parent, for each child.











You can be fined if your child has a total of 5 days of unauthorised absences in 10 school weeks, for things like:

- being late after the register has closed
- truancy
- taking a holiday without permission from the school
- or if a headteacher isn't satisfied for the reason for missing school

Over a rolling 3-year period the sanctions are:

- 1st offence £160 reduced to £80 if paid within 21 days
- 2nd offence £160
- 3rd offence Court hearing and up to £2,500 fine, or up to 3 months in prison and a criminal record


